Final preparations are now underway

CIRCLEVILLE - With the Foresman Chimes at the Pickaway County Courthouse set to ring in the opening of the 104th annual Circleville Pumpkin Show in a week, organizers and volunteer workers are busy in preparation for the Greatest Free Show on Earth.

While the Pumpkin Show officially opens 9 a.m., Wednesday, Oct. 20, and runs through Saturday. Oct. 23, in downtown Circleville with all of the parades, displays, entertainment, contests, food choices, and pumpkin delicacies visitors have grown to expect, this year's Pumpkin Show has several added attractions.

Building on a new tradition launched several years ago, the show actually but unofficially begins 5 p,m. Tuesday with

7 p.m., and follows the traditional Pumpkin Show parade route.

"We expect 50 to 75 groups in the parade including 15 floats, two Ted Lewis characters, several marching bands, and a bunch of old vehicles including a Wells Fargo stagecoach driven by Alan Schneckloth," he told Pumpkin Show parade announcers at a Tuesday night meeting.

Wells Fargo established an office in Circleville in 1916 with Samuel P. Denman as its first agent, he said.

The preview night concludes with a performance by local musician Seth Gibson from 8-10 p.m., again on the Main Street stage.

Thursday's festivities include performances by the University State Ohio Marching Band, both in a special concert in the parking lot of the Trinity Lutheran Church and as participants in the popular Parade of Bands which begins at 8 p.m.

"The fact that they are coming back to the Pumpkin Show just shows what a great job everyone did when they were here in 2006," said Barry Keller, vice-president of the annual event. "We estimate

they brought in an additional 15,000 people that night, even with the pouring rain.

The band will be escorted from its Columbus campus to Circleville by the Pickaway County Sheriff's Office with assistance by police departments in Columbus, South Bloomfield, and Circleville.

"With 225 members, The University State Marching Band is one of the few college all-brass and percussion bands in the country and is acknowledged as the largest of its type in the world," he said.

Sponsorship of the band's appearance is Healthcare

Logistics.

The band is composed of six members from Pickaway County - Westfall's Nick Bechtel, Tyler Rogols and Mark Bowling; Ben Crowder and David Fosnaugh from Teays Valley; and Lindsay Conkel, who graduated from Grove City High School but who lives in Orient.

The band will be led through the parade by the Ohio State University cheerleaders.

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
