According to the Web site, the show's origins go back to 1903 when Circleville mayor George Haswell decided to host a small exhibit in front of his West Main Street home. Since pumpkins made up one of the primary decorations for the exhibit, it became known as the pumpkin show.

Over time, more involvement from area merchants helped the show grow until a permanent organization made up of volunteers formed to take over operations for an annual pumpkin show. In 1946, the nonprofit Circleville Pumpkin Show lnc. was formed.

The show's annual attendance over the multiple days is estimated at an average of 300,000 people by show organizers.
